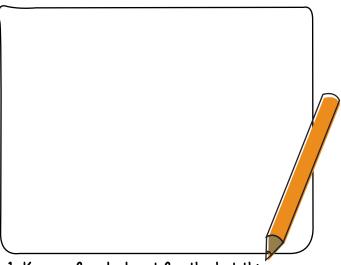
Answers: Q1: Gas appliances burning with a lazy yellow or orange flame that is normally crisp and blue; increased levels of condensation inside windows; pilot lights in boilers frequently blowing out; and soot or yellow/brown staining around or on appliances. Q2: Taping around windows to stop draughts; and taping air vents to stop draughts

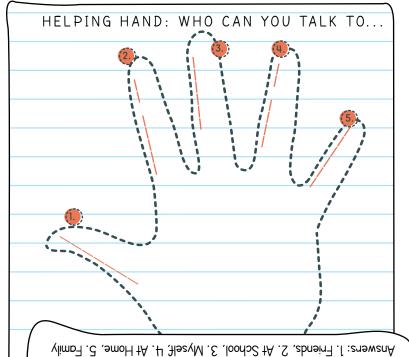
1 IN 2 YOUNG PEOPLE AT SOME POINT HAVE EXPERIENCED BULLYING.

Bullying can happen in many ways:

- Physical hitting, kicking, punching, pushing and slapping.
- Verbal name calling, making fun of someone, laughing at someone, spreading rumours, racial comments and threatening someone.
- Emotional spreading rumours, leaving people out, gossiping, harming someone's reputation and ignoring someone.
- Cyberbullying using the internet to: send hurtful messages, spreading rumours through social media, posting inappropriate images and sending out someone's personal information.'

FOR SAFE TRAVEL



General advice

- When it is dark, always wait in well-lit places
- Keep valuables, like your phone, out of sight
- Don't carry too much, so you can move quickly to avoid trouble
- Try to travel with someone else, or in a group
- Make sure you can always hear what is going on
- Before you travel, discuss with your parents/carers what you will do if
 - Your bus doesn't turn up
 - You accidently get on the wrong bus
- Keep your mobile phone with you, if you have one, in case of emergency

Travelling on buses

- Wait on the pavement, where you can be seen
- Behave sensibly and don't mess around or push each other into the road
- When you see your bus approaching, signal the driver to stop by holding our your arm
- Wait until the bus had stopped and the doors are fully open before you try to board
- After showing/buying your ticket, take your seat as soon as possible
- Always respect bus drivers and do not distract them while they are driving
- When you need to get off the bus, press the STOP button and remain seated until the bus has pulled into your stop
- Stand back from the doors until they are fully open
- Watch your step as you exit
- If you have to cross the road after getting off the bus, wait until the bus has moved away before attempting to cross

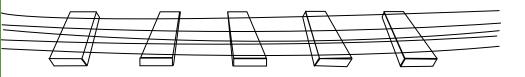

If there was a flood, you can follow the **do's** & **don'ts** below to keep yourself safe:

DO'S:

- Avoid touching flood water it may be contaminated with sewage or chemicals.
 WASH your hands with clean water if you touch flood water.
- Listen to the radio for more information about what is going on in your area.
- Stay away from electrical cables electrical currents can travel through water.

DON'TS:

- Don't walk through flood water currents can be deceptive. REMEMBER,
 15cm of fast flowing water is enough to knock you off your feet.
- Don't make dams at rivers or block pipes - this could make the flooding situation worse.
- Don't cross bridges or play on river banks - these could collapse at any time!

GO IN

Go in, close doors and windows and wait for an adult to give you advice on what to do next.

STAY IN

Stay indoors until you know more about what is going on. Plan with an adult what might be the safest thing to do. Remember, the most important thing is to keep yourself safe. Think about all the risks there could be depending on the danger. Sometimes the safest thing to do is wait for instructions.

TUNE IN

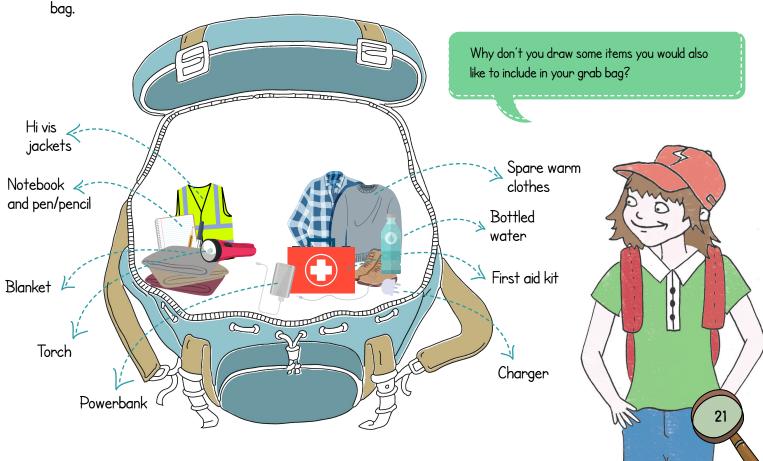
Listen to local radio and television to find out more about what is happening. Local radio stations will give messages advising people of the current danger and what actions should be taken. You could also check your local emergency agency social media pages.

GET OUT WHEN TOLD

Stay safe, always listen to the advice of the emergency services and evacuate only when told to do so by a trusted adult.

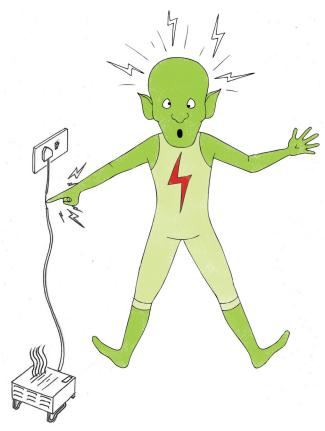

Electricity always tries to find a path to reach the ground and it will travel through any material that conducts electricity to get there, taking whatever shortcut it can. Some materials don't allow electricity to flow through them easily and these are known as _______. 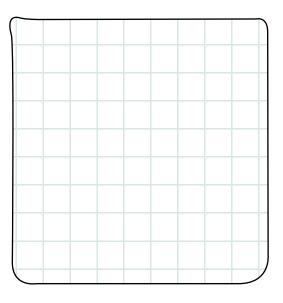
DON'T PLAY AROUND WITH ELECTRICITY



This is the 'Danger of Death' warning sign which is displayed on equipment on the electrical network. You will see these signs on substations, wooden poles and pylons carrying power lines. You will also see these signs on pillars in the street, which provide electricity to street lights and traffic lights.



COPY the Danger of Death sign using the grid to guide you.



REMEMBER equipment and buildings displaying this sign are dangerous. Always look around and look up for this sign. You don't even have to touch power lines with something to be in danger because at high voltage, electricity can jump across gaps!

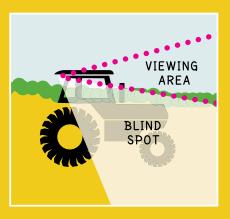




BLIND SPOTS - Remember, you can't always be seen!

NEVER STAND NEAR A MOVING TRACTOR!

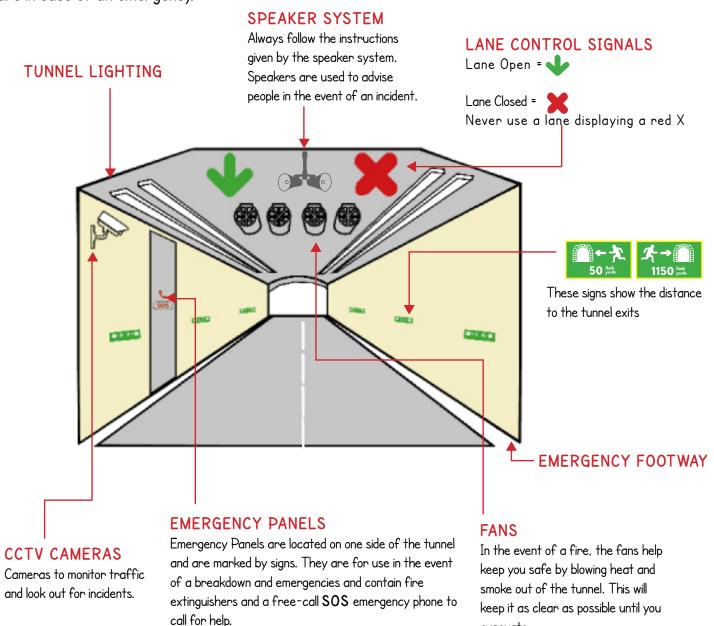

DO YOU KNOW WHO TRAFFIC OFFICERS ARE AND HOW THEY HELP KEEP OUR ROADS SAFE?

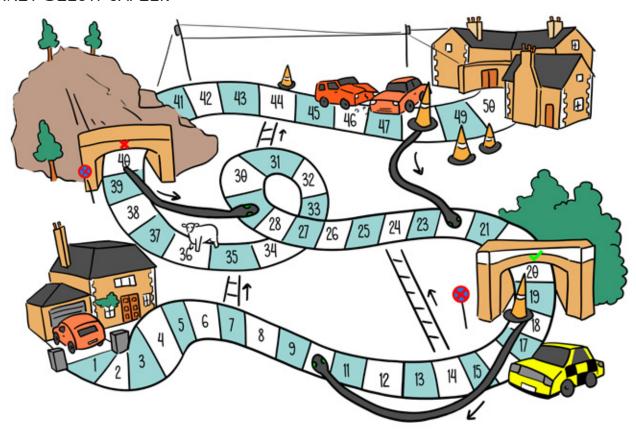
Traffic Officers patrol some of the busiest roads in North Wales to look out for problems to help keep the traffic moving. They have the powers to stop and direct traffic and pedestrians in a emergency, or deal with a situation that may cause a danger to the public.

OTHER WAYS TRAFFIC OFFICERS CAN HELP:

- Help with breakdowns and recover the vehicle by towing to the nearest place of safety.
- Arrange recovery of vehicles that may be causing a danger or obstruction.
- Remove anything from the road that could cause a danger to road users.
- Help pedestrians that are putting either themselves or other road users at risk walking through the tunnels is quite a common one.
- Deal with stray animals on the roads.
- Help with roadworks.
- Help the emergency services with road traffic collisions, by managing and directing traffic.

Key

If you land at the bottom of a ladder, you can move up to the top of it.

If you land on an obstruction, you must slide down the snake

RULES OF THE ROAD:

It is important to be sensible on the road. Put these Rules of the Road in order by writing a number before each one. Remember how you are supposed to cross the road, and don't get distracted.

1 Think first

Arrive alive

Wait until it is safe to cross

Listen

Stop

Look right, look left, look right again

DISCUSS with your parent/carer about a route that you take regularly, talking about safe places to cross etc.



CYCLE SAFETY

To ensure that your bike is safe to ride, you should complete an M-CHECK every few months. Follow the M and numbered checks below:

1) FRONT WHEEL:

Check the forks and spokes are not bent or damaged.

Tyre is well inflated, no damage to the rim.

Brakes on the rim not the tyre, brake pads not worn or missing. Brake cable is not broken, frayed, or damaged.

2) HANDLE BARS:

Straight and not wobbling about when front wheel is kept still (also not too high/low for the rider). Can reach brake/gear levers. Both brakes work- i.e. they stop the bike from moving.

4) SEAT: Ensure seat is not raised beyond the limit mark (also not too high/low for the rider).
Seat post is securely closed.
Saddle is straight and doesn't move about at all.

3) PEDALS/FRONT GEARS:

Pedals not loose.

Gears not obviously damaged. Chains in good condition/no damage.

5) BACK WHEEL:

Same as the Front Wheel.
Bolt or quick release connecting
the wheel to the bike is tight.
The gears and chain are secure,
no obvious damage, not
obstructed by anything, etc.

If you get into trouble in the water, FLOAT until you feel calm

Don't swim hard. Grab hold of anything that floats, like a bodyboard or ball. Lean back to keep your mouth and nose out of the water.



Push your belly up and stretch out your arms and legs into a star shape. Gently move your hands and feet to help you float.



When you're calm, raise your arm and shout for help, or swim to safety if you can.

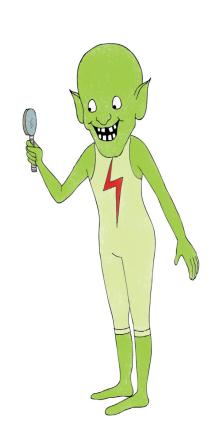
